

INSTRUCTIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

All farm and garden products must have been produced or harvested in the present year, and only one exhibit of every variety from the same planting crop can be entered for premiums in its class. Exhibitors need to follow the rules for the article they are entering in the different contests.

Exhibitors need to follow the rules for the article they are entering in the different contests.

Awards will in no case be made when the exhibit is deemed (by the judges) to be unworthy of the premium.

When there is but one competitor in a class, the judges may award the first premium, if meritorious, but if not worthy of receiving the first premium, and in the opinion of the judges, the article may be worthy of second premium, then the judges must award only the second premium.

If the society should not receive money enough to pay premiums to exhibitors in full, they will be paid proportionally, according to what the society may receive. Any article receiving a cash premium at any previous fair of this Society is not entitled to any reward this year.

The association offers a liberal reward for the arrest and conviction of any person or persons apprehended in committing any malicious mischief or removing or purloining any articles left with the association for exhibition or otherwise.

Authentic pedigrees of bloodstock of all kinds will be required, which must be filed with the secretary at time of entry. No animal will be allowed a premium unless sound. Health papers must be presented before animals are unloaded. No grade males are allowed.

No person shall be permitted in the judging ring except the judges, grooms, or persons in charge of the animals, officers of the association, and members of the press.

Articles on display, will be marked with tags, furnished by the secretary, designating the number of entry, and during the entire fair they must be placed entirely under the control of the officers of the association, and must in no case be removed

before the close of the fair without special permission by the secretary or superintendent.

The managers will take every precaution for the safe keeping of animals and articles after arrival and arrangements for exhibition. The association will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Exhibitors must give personal attention to their animals and articles, and at the close of the fair attend to their removal.

Exhibitors, when requested by superintendents of departments, are expected to make verbal or written statements concerning their contributions. Refusal to comply with such a request may bar the exhibit from premium.

Judges examining animals and articles are requested to report their awards to the secretary and to him only, until after the award of premiums is published.

NOVELTIES

Any person having novelties of any kind that would prove instructive or interesting will confer a favor on the society by presenting them for exhibition. This applies to all departments

**SPECIAL NOTICE
TO LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS AND
PULLING COMPETITORS**

All Livestock Exhibitors and Pulling Competitors bringing Campers will be subject to a \$25.00 camping fee. Livestock Exhibitors should note special instructions below.

**GENERAL RULES AND
REGULATIONS**

Livestock camping entries and fee of \$25 must be submitted prior to the fair and approved by the Livestock Superintendent. Please use the Livestock camping registration form in the rear of this book. Camping spaces are 10 feet wide and tip outs may not be able to be accommodated. Exhibitors with tents are also required to pre-register using the livestock camping registration form in the rear of this book, and no tents or campers will be set up without being registered first through the Livestock office. One vehicle per camper. All other vehicles must be parked outside the gate in parking areas.

All Entries must be received by the Livestock Superintendent by **the second Saturday of August**. No telephone entries will be accepted. Entries received after the second Saturday of August will be declined to show. All animals must be entered under owner's name. No substitutions will be allowed. Entries limited to space available on a first come-first served basis.

IMPORTANT NOTE; Due to limited space, if any exhibitor must cancel, he or she must call the Livestock Superintendent as early as possible. The telephone number for the on grounds fair secretary's office is (207) 374-3701.

Quality hay may be purchased on the grounds. To ensure enough hay is available, please indicate on your entry how many bales you will need. Exhibitors needing to purchase straw for bedding also need to indicate on your entry how many bales you will need for the duration of the fair to ensure an adequate supply.

Due to the lack of space, stalls, and pens must not be used for sleeping quarters or storage. Only animals to be officially entered may be housed on the grounds.

All cattle must be haltered when they are being shown.

Exhibitors of Prize Winners must show animals in front of grandstand if requested.

All stock must be on the fairgrounds by 9:00a.m. on Friday; sheep must be in place Thursday afternoon before the show which begins at 5:00p.m.

No stalling charges are deducted from premiums.

Animals competing for group premiums must first be entered for single premiums

At the time of entry, or on request of proper officials, all livestock entered as purebred must show a registration certificate issued by the Association making such registration, in owner's name. In compliance with State law, no premiums will be paid on grade males.

The Management reserves the right to accept or reject any entry made. The Management further reserves the right to interpret any rule or statement made in this book.

The premium list is under the approval of the Board of Directors and any further changes or awards will not be made without their consent.

In 4-H Dairy, there will be a limit of five animals for each senior member, three for each junior member.

The age of each animal, unless otherwise specified shall be determined as of July 1, 2016.

A prize of \$15 will be awarded for the birth of any large animal by one on exhibition during the Fair (except rabbits).

No Grade males are allowed on the premises.

No interference with any judges, State Veterinarian or State Official will be allowed when these persons are discharging their duties. Any abusive language by the exhibitor or their attendants shall make these exhibitors liable to be suspended from the privileges of this fair, livestock show, or exhibition by the Livestock Superintendent, or Show Committee, and forfeiture of all prize money.

HERDSMEN'S & SHEPARDS AWARDS

There will be awards made to the outstanding herdsman and Shepard's in Classes 1,2,3,4,& 5. All participants will be divided into Group 1 or Group 2, depending on the number of animals. Full details will be available at the Fair. Judging will remain the same.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

1. No Brucellosis or Tuberculin test is required for cattle and goats in the State if they originate directly from herds within the State, not under quarantine.
2. Domestic animals offered for show or exhibition at any fair or livestock show or exhibition, showing evidence of external parasites, foot rot, shipping fever, or other diseases* may be excluded from or ordered removed from the fair or exhibition, or otherwise handled as the Director of the Division of Animal Industry may direct. (*Ringworm and warts are classified as infectious disease).
3. All domestic animals originating outside the State of Maine must meet the same requirements to show as are required for entry into the State.
4. All horses must have a negative Coggins Test Certificate (Equine Infectious Anemia), 6 months for out of state resident, and 36 months for Maine residents.
5. The Maine Fair Superintendents have recommended that all animals should be vaccinated against I.B.R., P.I.3, and B.V.D. This is not required.

ENTRY FEE: \$3 per animal, payable to the Downeast Dairy Goat Assoc.

Entries will be limited to 160 animals. There will be a limit of two (2) animals per class per breed for each exhibitor. All Livestock including goats should be entered by 9 AM Friday. Entries will be accepted on a first come first served basis, determined by postmark. NO entries will be accepted postmarked prior to August 1st, or after the second Saturday in August.

There will be no pre-show milk out.

The ADGA show begins at 8:30 a.m. Monday. The 4-H show will be on Sunday, at 3:30 p.m.

The Blue Hill Fair ADGA Dairy Goat Show will be an official JUNIOR and SENIOR DOE SHOW. The Junior and Senior shows are separately sanctioned.

ADGA rules, categories, registry, and age requirements will apply.

Original registration papers must be submitted on all animals over 6 months of age. All animals under 6 months of age may be shown with a stamped duplicate registration. A stamped duplicate is only valid for 30 days from the date ADGA issues. No copies of registration papers will be accepted. Persons showing animals whose papers have been signed for transfer but have not been processed for transfer by

the ADGA office, must show those animals as agents for the current owner shown on the ADGA records.

Registration papers are required and must be presented to the Show Secretary or Chairperson by 9:00 a.m. Saturday

Entries will include only recorded grade or registered animals of any ADGA recognized breed. Stalling will be limited to hornless and recognized dairy breeds only.

All animals will be inspected by the show chairman at the time of arrival. At the discretion of the chairman, or the Blue Hill Fair Livestock department, the vet on call for the fair may be asked to further evaluate the animals. Any animals showing signs of a contagious illness will be asked to leave and the exhibitor will forfeit any entry money.

Breeds shown and order of show, shall be Alpine, Lamancha, Oberhasli, AOP, Nubian, Recorded Grades. The show order may be subject to change and the possible reason is to make the show run smoothly. Junior show will be held first, followed by Senior show.

Permanent Champions are not restricted to the Champion Challenge only. All animals must be shown in their respective classes to be shown in specialty classes.

The Danish System

The Danish System requires that each competitor be compared to a predetermined standard of excellence and awarded a blue, red or white ribbon based on those standards. In the Danish system, exhibitors within a class are never compared to one another as they are judged under the standard ranking system. Since participants are judged against a set of criteria on an individual basis, not against other participants, it is possible for each participant in a class to earn a blue ribbon. A "First Blue" ribbon is awarded to the best of the blue ribbon winners.

Blue Ribbon – Outstanding or excellent work. The exhibitor has met and /or exceeded basic requirements of the class. One or two minor faults, if immediately corrected, do not eliminate an exhibitor from the blue ribbon category.

Red Ribbon - Good Work. An exhibitor completed the required work but with an accumulation of faults; missed leads, broken gaits, excessive speed, lack of coordination, poor equitation, poor grooming or dirty or poor fitting tack.

White Ribbon – Needs Improvement. An exhibitor completed the class but with some major faults or broken patterns; inability to execute and maintain a required gait or performing in wrong lead without attempting to make a correction.

4-H LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

Competition is open to all Maine 4-H members age 9 and older. Each Exhibitor must meet the requirements of a 4-H project.

All animals must be owned and registered in the name of the 4-H club member by June 30. (See individual sections for exceptions.) Leased animals will be permitted. All animals must meet the entry, residence, health and other requirements listed under the Livestock Department General Rules.

REGULATIONS FOR 4-H ANIMAL SHOWS AT MAINE AGRICULTURAL FAIRS.

1. “4-H Age” is defined as the age of the 4-H member as of December 31 of the current 4-H year. All ages below are “4-H Ages.”
 - 4-H exhibitors must be 9 through 19 years of age in order to show competitively in any 4-H animal show.
 - 4-H CloverBud members ages 5-8 may participate in non-competitive demonstration shows using females or neutered males. One-on-one supervision by an adult or older teen is required. All Participants will receive identical forms or recognition of participation.
2. All shows that require exhibitors ages 9 through 19 present the standard Approval Form for 4-H Animal Shows.
3. Each animal must be listed on only one member’s approval form, with exception of horse.
4. Since animal approval forms document animal projects, Cloverbud members will not be required to use Animal Approval Forms for annual activities.
5. 4-H members ages 9 through 19 must fit any animals they show.
6. 4-H members 9 through 19 may use leased animals in 4-H shows.
7. 4-H exhibitors must wear 4-H colors while showing in the 4-H shows. White shirts with no lettering front or back, with green, black or tan pants. Work boots are strongly suggested for showing larger animals. No hats allowed in the show ring. The exceptions include dairy goat shows and dairy cattle shows where the 4-H’ers wear all white.

Be sure to illustrate or prepare written statements on how the group incorporated Belonging, Independence, Generosity, and Mastery into their time together with this project. Example – Creating an exhibit for the fair or helping others learn what you have learned would e an example of both Mastery and Generosity.

Originality - Was it creative and imaginative? Use 3-D when possible examples (trophies, scrapbooks, or other small project items)

Rule 2: In Accordance with 4-H regulations in regards to Cloverbuds, 5 to 8 year olds will receive a stipend of \$2.00 for each exhibit put in the hall with a special ribbon to designate

their work. If different level is specified, clover buds should complete beginner level. For all regular 4-Hers if the project level is not specified please follow this

- 1st and 2nd year beginner
- 3rd and 4th year intermediate
- 5th and up senior

Rule 3: Two exhibits may be entered in all classes, with the exception of crafts which may have four, but items must not be the same medium. (Example: Art cannot do two watercolors, but could enter a watercolor and a charcoal.) Original works only made in the current 4-H year. **No Kits.** Posters may not be larger than 14"x22".

RULE 4: Exhibits must remain in the 4-H Hall until 6 PM Labor Day, or forfeit the premiums. Premiums will be distributed at the time of exhibit pickup which is 6 to 6:30 pm on Labor Day.

RULE 5: The judges may award first, second, or third place premiums according to the merits of the exhibits. Should an exhibit be of inferior quality or form and in the opinion of the judges, unworthy of a premium, it will be eliminated from the judging. Decisions of the judges will be final.

RULE 6: No More than 10 Best Project Ribbons given to the projects seen worthy by judges. Best of Show will be decided from these exhibits. Best Project Ribbon will also receive \$10. Best of Show to receive an additional \$15. Decisions of the Judges will be final.

RULE 7: Any article made by a member should display appropriate skills for the level exhibited. Specify level on tag. Any question, consult Hall Supervisor.

RULE 8: All exhibits must be checked into the hall between 3 and 7 p.m. on the Tuesday prior to opening of the fair. **Exhibit cards and hall entry forms must be completed beforehand. Exhibit cards must be firmly attached to exhibits, and filled out properly. Check spelling and use highlighter**

RULE 9: Each project must be produced solely by the individual member. Clubs may work together on projects, but members are responsible for producing their own entry. (Example: Club produced batches of cookies are not acceptable.)

RULE 10: Knives, Firearms or any other item, which could be considered a weapon, should not be included as a part of an exhibit. A drawing or a three dimensional model may be substituted.

ART – A freehand drawing or painting (ready for hanging, properly matted and or/framed) in oil, watercolor, acrylic, charcoal, pencil, pastel, crayon, or marker. NO paint by number or tracings. If two exhibits are done, each must be in a different medium.

Other original art items such as sand art, pictures, Scratch art, scrimshaw, paper mache and sculpture will be accepted.

An article made by a member such as: Collection of 6 flies, including 1 dry, 1 nymph, 1 streamer, and 3 other flies mounted on a wooden board or poster board, **Or** fishing related item appropriate to age and years in project, (Refer to rule 2) **Or** four 4x6 photos that tell a story with individual labels.

FLOWER GARDEN

Beginner: A bouquet of your flowers or 1 plant in waterproof container.

Intermediate: An arrangement using your own flowers.

Senior: Fresh flower corsage or a dried arrangement using your own flowers.

FOODS PRESERVATION

Beginner: 2 jars of different produce (choice of fruits, berries, tomatoes, or jam.)

Intermediate: 3 Jars of different produce (choice of fruits, vegetables, jam, jelly, berries, pickles, or relish.)

Senior: 4 Jars of different produce (choice same as intermediate.

FOODS AND NUTRITION

Beginner: 3 baked cookies or brownies, any kind.

Intermediate: 3 muffins or 3 biscuits.

Senior: 1st & 2nd years – 1 loaf white or 1 loaf wheat grain bread. After 2nd year –1 double crust pie or 1 meringue top pie with a homemade filling. Any group may do a recipe collection of at least 10 recipes displayed in a box or notebook. (Must include source, member comments and recommendations.)

GARDEN

Beans or Peas(10 pods); Beets, Cucumbers, Carrots, Parsnips, Onions, Peppers, Tomatoes (green or ripe); Potatoes, (3 of each): Radishes or Brussels Sprouts (5); Dried Beans (1 pint); Kale (3 stalks); Celery (1 stalk); Summer Squash Turnip, Rutabagas, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Broccoli, Melon, Squash, Pumpkin Eggplant(1 each). Vegetables should be wiped clean, trimmed, and fresh. **Lynn Clement Garden Plaque to best of project.**

HEALTH AND SAFETY

An article made or prepared by 4-H'er related to health and safety such as: a first aid kit; medicinal herbs display; ATV, bicycle or tractor safety display.

HERBS

5 stems of each herb chosen in container with water.

HOME IMPROVEMENT

An article made by a member used to decorate room or home, such as a pillow, hooked rug, quilt, or 4-6 photos to show a room improvement from beginning to end. Article should display appropriate skill level.

INDOOR GARDENING- Beginner: Potted houseplant. **Intermediate:** Dish Garden or terrarium. **Senior:** Potted arrangement of flowering plants.

KNITTING

See 4-H Knitting Project Skills List for specific skills. **Beginner:** An article made using 1 or 2 different stitches. **Intermediate:** An article made using 2 or more different stitches. **Senior:** An article using 3 or more different stitches.

LEATHERCRAFT- Beginner: Intermediate: Senior: Please contact Extension office for requirements.

MUSIC & MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS-

A display that illustrates to the public what has been done in the project during the current 4-H year. Include a written explanation of the exhibit on a 3"x5" card.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Forestry through Outdoor Living

FORESTRY

Beginner: 10 twigs and pressed leaves from 10 different trees, properly mounted and labeled in a notebook.

Intermediate: A display of cross cuts of wood from 10 different trees, properly labeled.

Senior: Collection of at least 4 diseased, insect, or animal damaged specimens, or a display of some phase of industrial forestry, such as Christmas tree production or commercial logging, etc.

GEOLOGY-

Beginner: 10 rocks or minerals; labeled.

Intermediate: 15 rocks or minerals: labeled.

Advanced: 20 different rocks or minerals, labeled. All of the rocks and minerals must have been collected by the 4-H member during this 4-H year.

SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION-

An exhibit to show poor practice and how to fix it, **Or**, before and after photos with an explanation to show their own conservation project, **Or**, an educational poster about the project.

WILDFLOWERS

Beginner: 5 study sheets with different pressed flowers or drawings in a hardcover scrapbook. 2 of these must be pictures or your own drawings of wildflowers that you should NOT pick.

Intermediate: 10 study sheets with different preserved flowers or drawings in a hardcover scrapbook with 3 of these pictures or your own drawings of wildflowers that you should NOT pick.

Senior: 15 study sheets with different pressed flowers or drawings in a hardcover scrapbook with 4 of these pictures or drawings of wildflowers that you should NOT pick.

WILDLIFE-EARTH-CONNECTIONS

Collections should have at least 10 different samples and follow a theme (example – shells, pressed flowers, or items from a specific environment). All items should be mounted and labeled. Do not collect endangered species. Other creative exhibits showing what has been learned in the project will be accepted.

OUTDOOR LIVING

An educational display Or item made by the 4-H'er that is used in your Camping or Outdoor cooking project.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Pictures mounted in an album or in a notebook. All natural light, unless otherwise specified.

Beginner: Minimum of one picture each of person, animal, building, and landscape.

Intermediate: One indoor picture using flash, plus a photo story of at least 10 photos.

Senior: 15 prints showing good compositions of a building, a landscape, an animal, a close-up of a person, and a close up of an animal. These may be natural light or flash.

READING

Beginner: Design your own book cover, illustrating some segment of a book read, and insert a 3"x5" card with one paragraph description of the book.

Intermediate: Design your own book cover with a title page. Write a one page report on a book you read.

Senior: Put together a collection of the books you read this year with paragraphs and cover at least 5

RECREATION

Game, puzzle, or other exhibit for entertainment purposes.

SHOOTING SPORTS

Beginner: A diagram identifying various parts of a gun.

Intermediate: Compile a survival kit. Contents should be labeled and the purpose of each given.

Senior: Create a realistic injury, (i.e. doll could be used). Materials used in treating the injury could be displayed, **OR** explain outdoor related injury and way to prevent it (i.e. hypothermia);

OR construct a three dimensional model of a rifle or shot gun (material of your choice). Parts should be labeled with the functions of each;

OR construct a model of a safe shooting range with safety rules.

WOODWORKING

(For each level, an article equivalent to those suggested may be exhibited).

Beginner: Bookends or rack; napkin, key, letter, bag or broom holder; birdhouse, cutting board, picture frame, bootjack or stilts.

Intermediate: Toolbox, footstool; bench; candle holder; game, spice, tie, or magazine rack; tray; bird feeder; or telephone shelf.

Senior: Gun rack; toy; garage creeper; shoe shine kit; knife rack; or equivalent.

CREATIVITY- An outstanding individual project done by a member, may be entered under this class. As long as it does not fit under any project listed in the book Approval of this project must be obtained from the Hall Supervisor a minimum of ten days prior to the scheduled time of entry of exhibits into the hall. Must show appropriate level of skill or knowledge for unit level.
